DEAR COMMUNITY OF ASSUMPTION,

The summer months spent looking back at one school year while preparing for another provide a great opportunity for introspection. When I think back on this past year and all that we have experienced as a community, I can't help but consider the monumental changes that have taken place at Assumption in such a short amount of time.

While we started this past school year grappling with opening our school building and keeping our faculty, staff, and students safe from COVID, we ended it with our student body returning fully in person and hosting our culminating and celebratory events together. The Junior Ring Ceremony, Pink and White Game, and Baccalaureate and Graduation may have looked a little different, but the important thing is that we were able to host these cherished events, and many others, in person allowing our students to make those lasting memories as a community and celebrate what makes Assumption so special.

Despite the challenges presented by COVID, there was still much to celebrate. Some of these were collective accomplishments, such as the Class of 2021 earning an all-time high of over \$33 million in college scholarships. Other achievements were individual, including two students being selected as Congressional Art Competition winners who were personally recognized by Congressman John Yarmuth as well as our record-setting 22 students who were accepted to the Governor's Scholars Program and Governor's School for the Arts.

Other achievements were schoolwide. We successfully completed our five-year accreditation review and were recognized by COGNIA, our accrediting body, for being an outstanding educational institution with special commendation for our culture of excellence and strong sense of community.

We also finalized a dynamic three-year strategic plan that will take us to 2023 and set the stage for future growth and success. In addition, our board of directors recently approved our five-year Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Plan. Overviews of both plans can be found on our website.

There are some very visible changes to our campus as well. If you have been by AHS recently, you've no doubt witnessed the impressive campus revitalization that is underway. The addition of a prominent and accessible main entrance, beautiful chapel, 10 additional classrooms, along with a new cafeteria and kitchen, will solve many of our space issues and allow us to expand our curriculum in new and exciting ways.

Other changes being made aren't as visible but every bit as important. We are addressing circulation throughout the school by connecting our original school building and the "CAC" (Convocation and Athletics

Center) on both the second and third floors for greater accessibility and easier movement throughout the school. Another major change is the massive renovation of our original cafeteria, which will become the new home for our long-standing and highly respected Learning Differences program, while our Boeckmann Technology Lab will be revamped to better serve our students and their IT needs.

These projects are made possible through our Launching the Future Campaign which supports these improvements as well as expands our financial aid and scholarship programs. We are closing in on our \$8 million campaign and invite you to join with us in this important endeavor that will transform the educational experience for every young woman who walks through our doors. Most exciting is that these campus changes will be in place to welcome our students when they return in August.

While we can all celebrate that COVID is on the retreat, we recognize that it has forever altered the way we will educate for the future. More specifically, it's changing the landscape of education in new and dynamic ways. Hybrid and virtual learning are no longer a distant vision but a current reality. I look forward to sharing more with you on how Assumption is reinventing the current classroom to better serve our students for the future.

When I think back on the tumultuousness of this past year and the challenges we endured, I'm amazed at the strength and resilience of our community and the continued commitment to providing an outstanding Catholic, Mercy education, no matter the obstacles. As Catherine McAuley, the foundress of the Sisters of Mercy, said over a century ago, "We must do ordinary things extraordinarily well." Please join us in this extraordinary moment in Assumption's history by helping us launch an incredible future for every AHS student now and for decades to come.

1956

The original Assumption Convent broke ground in 1956 and was added as a home for the Mercy Sisters, opening in 1957. Prior to being built, the sisters lived on the third floor of the main building. In 1998 the convent was renamed the McAuley Center.



1989 A small expansion project to the front area of the school was started, opening in 1990 The building included new classrooms and office space. The Boeckmann computer lab was added during this time.

1994

The Arts and Sciences wing officially broke ground on June 28, 1994, and opened in spring 1995. This wing provided Assumption with a dedicated space for science labs as well as a new art classroom and music room





2005

The Assumption Green sits on 11.9 acres of land and began with the completion of the track and field area in 2005. In 2006, the softball field was completed. The indoor sports complex was completed in 2012, featuring classrooms, solar panels, a green roof system, and other environmentally friendly amenities. The indoor softball facility was built and opened in spring of 2020, providing space year round for our softball team to train.



In the spirit of our new construction, here's a look at past campus renovations and improvements.

The 2020-2021 school year highlighted many things for us at Assumption High School. Chief among them was the power of community. By banding together in creative new ways, we were able to educate students during this pandemic either through a hybrid or virtual schedule and eventually ending the year fully in person with the ability to experience many cherished events and celebrating the accomplishments and milestones of our students.

While the pandemic presented many challenges, Assumption continued with its Launching the Future Campaign to raise \$8 million to enhance the Assumption experience. This campaign is focused on two components: improving our facilities to confront our space limitations and increasing our endowment to provide greater financial assistance to our students. Both initiatives reflect our unwavering commitment to remaining at the forefront of educational excellence and innovation.

As the campaign comes to a close, we are thrilled to share that we have raised \$7.6 million towards our \$8 million goal and that our expansion is slated to open before the start of school in August!




















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ALUMNAE UNITE FOR GIRLS' CATHOLIC EDUCATION

We are so humbled that our alumnae, united with the communities of Bethlehem, Holy Cross, Mercy, Presentation, and Sacred Heart, raised a combined total of \$276,000 for girls' Catholic education during Alumnae Unite. This initiative is so unique because although we compete against each other on the field and in the classroom, we all understand the importance of coming together and providing young women with the best possible education.

We are proud to say that Rocket pride was definitely on display during this campaign! In just 60 hours, over 1,000 Assumption alumnae stepped up, raising more than \$67,172 in support of the Annual Fund. Additionally, our alumnae participation grew from 6.4% to 16.83%, the highest it's been in recent years! While the numbers are exciting, the true win is for young women who have the opportunity to attend Assumption because of your generosity.




Though my senior year has been filled with unexpected changes, it is evident that compassion at Assumption isn't just a single act of kindness. It is something that is continually lived out.



She is a certified HP specialist, has grown our technology department, and has changed the way we teach and learn.





Mary Margaret Ralph H'08

In the fall of 1978, Mary Margaret Ralph began her 43 years at Assumption High School. She spent many years as theology department chair, senior class moderator, Operation Smile moderator, and a participant on several mission trips. Her work with seniors over the years has made her a fixture on senior retreat, leading and visiting other retreats to give the "Live the Fourth" talk. She created the famous senior Life Choices class that she taught for decades and then adapted over the past few years. She also holds the record for most times being chosen as the faculty speaker at graduation. Her ability to motivate and inspire students at such a pivotal moment in high school – especially this year as she managed to get the seniors to "make it hard to say goodbye" – is truly beyond measure.
