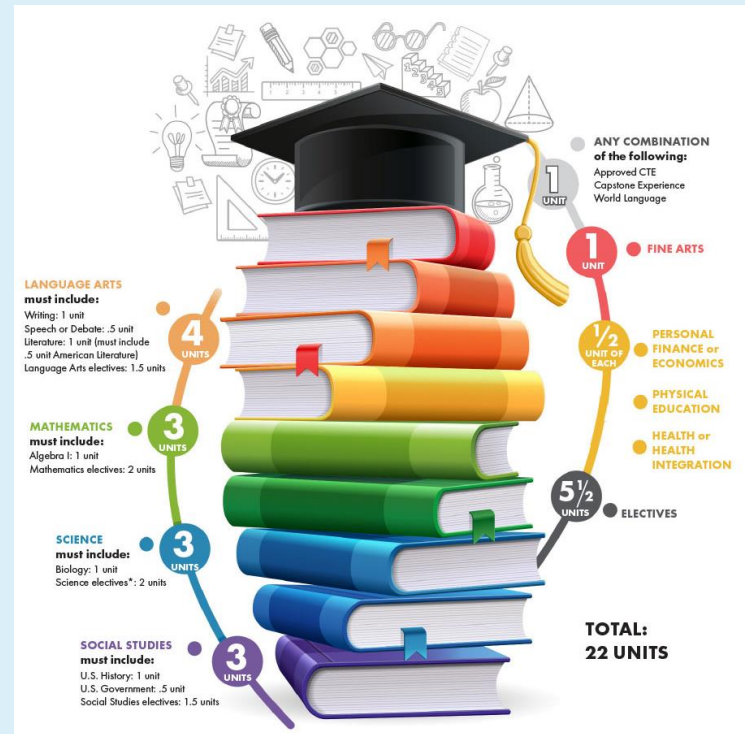
SPEAKING THE LANGUAGE: REGISTRATION PROCESS

- The time of year at Assumption when **your teachers, counselors, and deans talk to you about class selection for the following year.**
- This includes discussing levels in your required courses and helping you pick electives that will help you achieve your goals.
- **Happens during February and March each year.**
- This process is designed to help you achieve your academic goals.



SPEAKING THE LANGUAGE: REQUIREMENTS AND ELECTIVES

- **Requirements**—courses that you must take in order to graduate from Assumption
- **Electives**—courses that you get to choose to take



You take a combination of required and elective credit courses in order to earn enough credits to graduate.

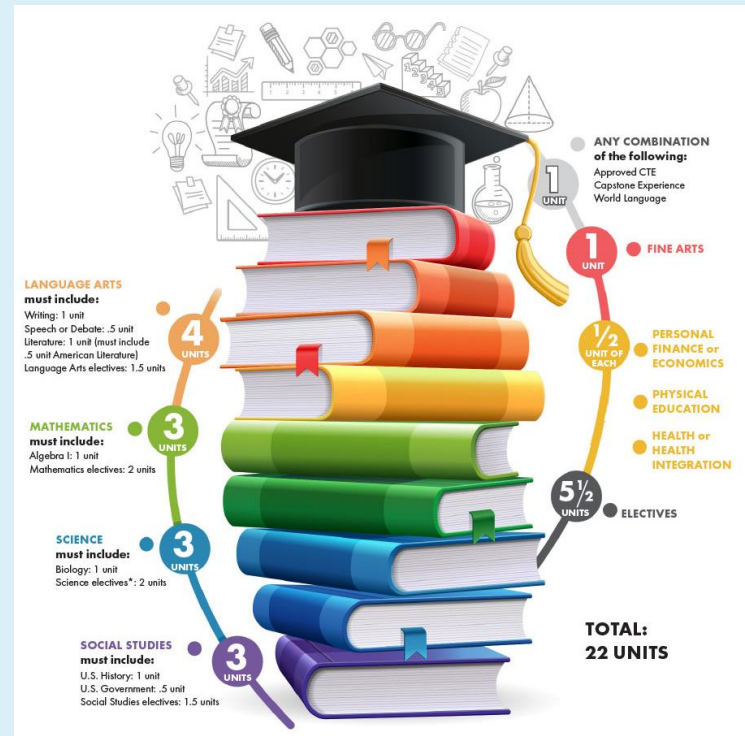
SPEAKING THE LANGUAGE: CREDITS

- A credit is the value assigned to each high school course you take.

AT ASSUMPTION:

Year-long course = 1 credit

Semester course = $\frac{1}{2}$ credit



You must earn 7 credits each year at Assumption and 28 total credits to graduate.

SOCIAL STUDIES

WORLD GEOGRAPHY

1/2 Credit | 1 Grade 9, 10, 11, 12
Advanced 902
Honors 902S
Accelerator 902S

Prerequisite: Social studies teacher recommendation required for the Advanced level.
This semester course examines the interactions of human and non-human systems of the earth, the atmosphere, and the hydrosphere, and the impact of these systems on human societies, cultures, and natural resources.

AP HUMAN GEOGRAPHY

AP 902 | Grades 9, 10, 11, 12

Prerequisite: Dean of studies or English teacher recommendation, but Course Levels of Difficulty for teacher requirements.
This course is designed to introduce students to the systematic study of patterns and processes that have shaped human understanding, use, and distribution of Earth's surface. Students employ spatial concepts and landscape analysis to analyze human social organization and the problems and potentials in United States

U.S. HISTORY

1 Credit | 1 Grade 10
Advanced 902
Honors 902S
Accelerator 902S

This course surveys United States history from the late 18th to the mid-20th century. Special emphasis is placed on major wars, social movements, culture, and diplomatic relations with other countries. The study of ethnic groups and of current events is an integral part of this course.

AP U.S. HISTORY

AP 920 | 1 Grade 10

Prerequisite: English teacher recommendation, but Course Levels of Difficulty for teacher requirements.
AP U.S. History prepares students for the AP exam in U.S. History and provides students with the analytical skills and factual knowledge necessary to deal effectively with the problems and potentials in United States

history. Students learn to assess historical materials and to weigh the evidence and interpretation presented in historical scholarship. The course examines some periods from discovery and settlement of the New World through the twenty-first century.

WORLD HISTORY

1 Credit | 1 Grade 11
Advanced 902
Honors 902S
Accelerator 902S

This course surveys world history from the Renaissance to the present. Special emphasis is placed on major wars, social movements, culture, and diplomatic relations with other countries. The study of ethnic groups and of current events is an integral part of this course.

DC WORLD HISTORY

1 Credit | 1 Grade 11

Prerequisite: English teacher recommendation, but Course Levels of Difficulty for teacher requirements.
AP U.S. History prepares students for the AP exam in U.S. History and provides students with the analytical skills and factual knowledge necessary to deal effectively with the problems and potentials in United States

This course, offered in conjunction with Western Kentucky University, provides the opportunity to choose from a variety of college credit for AP World History. This course provides a comprehensive historical survey of the major political, religious, and cultural developments in Asia, Africa, Europe, and the Americas from 1500 to the present.

AP WORLD HISTORY

AP 910 | 1 Grade 11

Prerequisite: U.S. History teacher recommendation, but Course Levels of Difficulty for teacher requirements.
AP World History prepares students for the World History AP exam. This course surveys world history, focusing on major historical eras of world history, as well as the politics, philosophy, economics, social conditions, and arts of various ages. Students learn to assess historical materials and to weigh the evidence and interpretation presented in historical scholarship. Geography and current events are integral parts of this course.

U.S. GOVERNMENT

1/2 Credit | 1 Grade 11, 12
Advanced 902
Honors 902S

Prerequisite: Social studies teacher recommendation required for the Advanced level.
This course examines the U.S. Constitution, the basic structure of U.S. government, and its institutions. The course facilitates students with various institutions, groups, beliefs, and ideas that comprise U.S. political society. Topics include the Constitution, political beliefs and parties, and rights and civil liberties, and current Supreme Court cases. Major domestic and foreign issues are emphasized.

AP UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT AND POLITICS

1 Credit | 1 Grade 11, 12
AP 940
AP 940S

Prerequisite: U.S. History teacher recommendation, but Course Levels of Difficulty for teacher requirements.
This course prepares students for the U.S. Government and Politics AP exam. It examines both the ideal and the actual of U.S. government and politics, and also the various institutions, groups, beliefs, and ideas that comprise U.S. political society. Topics include the Constitution, political beliefs and behaviors, political parties and interest groups, and civil rights and liberties.

PSYCHOLOGY

1 Credit | 1 Grade 11, 12
Advanced 902
Honors 902S

Prerequisite: Social studies teacher recommendation, but Course Levels of Difficulty for teacher requirements.
This course focuses on detailed information about the following history, concepts and applications to psychology, research methods and human psychology experiments, learning, memory, motivation, emotion, social and child development, personality theories, psychological disorders, treatment for psychological disorders, and social psychology.

AP PSYCHOLOGY

AP 900 | 1 Grade 11, 12

Prerequisite: Social studies teacher recommendation, but Course Levels of Difficulty for teacher requirements.
This course focuses on preparing students to take the AP exam in Psychology. This semester course covers topics including research methods, development, learning, the brain, emotions, motivation, perception, personality theories, psychological disorders, therapy for psychological disorders, and social psychology.

SOCIOLOGY

1/2 Credit | 1 Grade 11, 12
Advanced 902
Honors 902S

Prerequisite: Social studies or English teacher recommendation required for the Advanced level.
This course studies human behavior as a group situation. Students explore culture, social movements, social norms, the family, and specific social issues such as alternative social and crime.

WOMEN'S ISSUES IN SOCIOLOGY

1/2 Credit | 1 Grade 11, 12
Advanced 902
Honors 902S

Prerequisite: Social studies teacher recommendation, but Course Levels of Difficulty for teacher requirements.
Women's issues in sociology is a semester course that deals with the issues women face in society, both past and present. The course includes a study of women in various cultures throughout the world. The course covers such topics as gender roles, women's rights, and the role of women in society. The course also includes a study of women's issues in the workplace. Other topics pertaining to women are covered, including women's issues in science, politics, and women in the workplace.

HUMANITIES I

1 Credit | 1 Grade 10, 11, 12
Advanced 902
Honors 902S

Prerequisite: Social studies teacher recommendation required for the Advanced level.
This course helps develop the student's appreciation of human culture, civilization, and the history and patterns of the human world. Emphasis will be placed on the various cultures. Students will be able to apply the various important events of world and human history. Students will create projects in each of these areas.

HUMANITIES II

1/2 Credit | 1 Grade 12
Advanced 902
Honors 902S

Prerequisite: Humanities I or AP for Humanities.
This semester course expands on some of the topics covered in Humanities I, including philosophy, art, and science. In addition, both philosophy and science will be covered. The course will also include a study of the human condition, and the role of the individual in society. Next Steps of the Registration Process

- ▶ Teachers will conference with you in class on **Monday, March 10- Tuesday, March 11** about recommendations for levels next year and share elective information for classes in each department.

What do teachers discuss in conferences?

- Each teacher in your core content area classes will conference with you in class about recommendations for levels for next year.
- Most often the appropriate level of challenge for is **your current level or the comparable level to the one you are in for the following year.**
 - Your teacher may make a recommendation for you to consider some additional challenge or recommend that you change levels to help right pace your learning.



What do teachers discuss in conferences, con't?

If you have a question about changing your level that your teacher doesn't bring up,
THIS IS YOUR TIME TO ASK ABOUT IT.



- A good grade indicator for a levels move for more challenge is an average of a 93 or above for both semesters.
- **That typically means not only are you showing great study skills by doing your homework and assignments but also demonstrating mastery of learning in your tests, projects, etc.**
- There is a **grade requirement** for a move in English and math.

What do teachers discuss in conferences, con't?

- Also you can ask your teacher's feedback about electives in that department.
- **REMEMBER:** For any elective course that requires a teacher recommendation, you will need to talk to the appropriate teacher recommender as indicated in the course catalog.



What do teachers discuss in conferences, con't?

- ▶ If the teacher does not recommend a level move or elective option you in which you are interested, we want you to **take their perspective seriously.**
- ▶ If you want to discuss additionally, you can meet with your dean to discuss.

Classic scheduling mistakes you don't want to make



- ▶ Thinking that you can change a level next year “if I change my mind.”
 - ▶ If you make a levels move, we know it has been in consultation with your teacher and parent or you have committed to it with exemption form.
 - ▶ Our job to help you stay!
 - ▶ There are multiple steps that you will need to take.
 - ▶ Go for the extra challenge, but take the decision seriously and know we will help you work through your jitters.

7th Credit: Fine Art Requirement

- ▶ Assumption and the state of Kentucky require 1 full credit of fine art to graduate
 - ▶ Most of you have fulfilled a ½ credit of Fine Arts this year and will need an additional ½ credit of Fine Arts
 - ▶ *This additional half credit may be filled with any visual, performing, or non-performing arts course*
OR
 - ▶ *With Intro to Fine Arts*
 - ▶ *Adv/Honors I English 1 = Advanced Intro to Fine Arts*
 - ▶ *Honors/Academic English 1 = Honors Intro to Fine Arts* *OR*
 - ▶ *AP Art History or AP Music Theory which are 1 credit classes*

7th Credit—Half Credit Elective

- ▶ For those of you completing your fine art requirement as a sophomore you will have a ½ credit Elective Course to select.
 - ▶ You will need to check the levels and get teacher signatures to support you taking the class if necessary.
- ▶ If there is a year-long elective you would like to choose, you may do so.
 - ▶ Your ½ credit of fine art or year-long fine art requirement will need to be elected as a junior or senior.

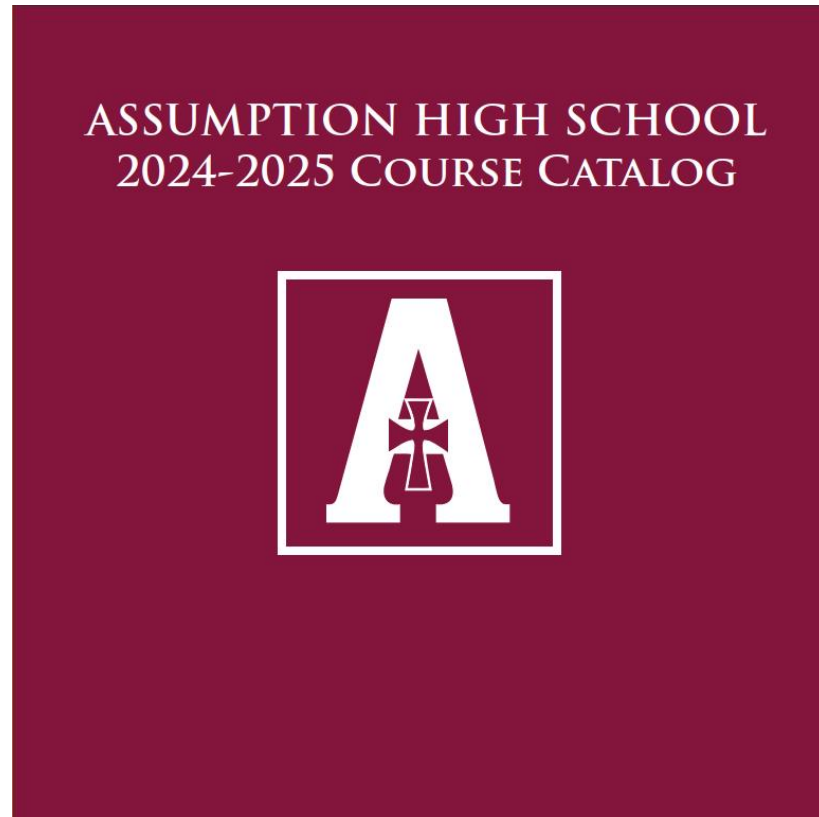
